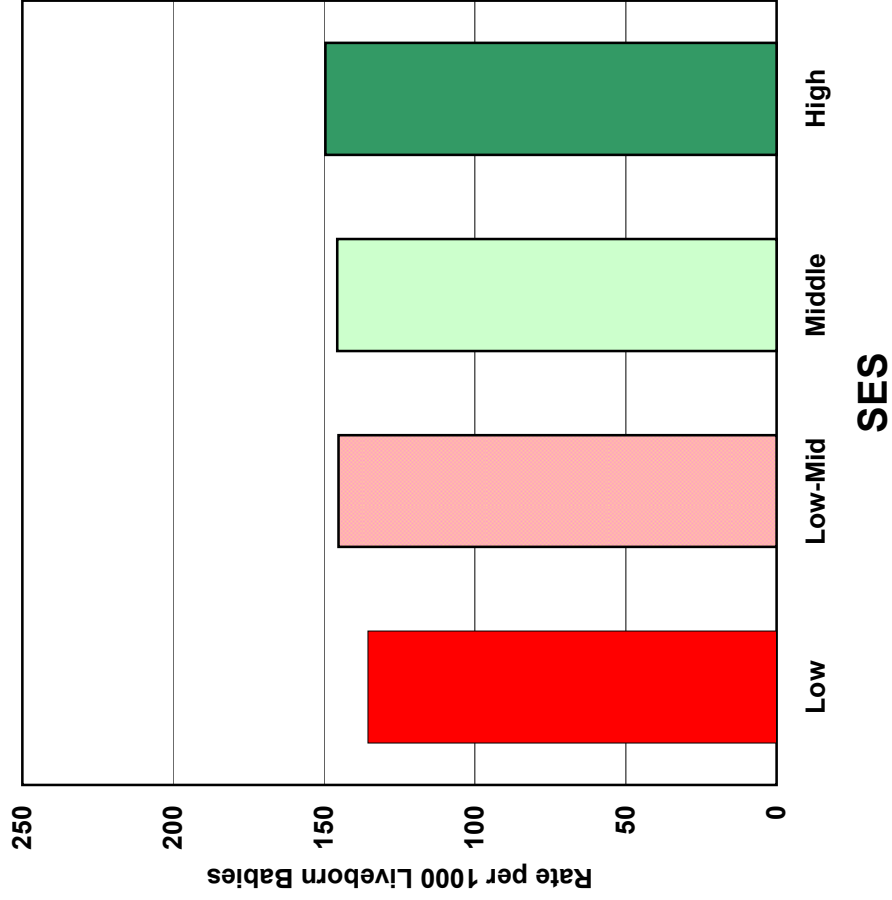

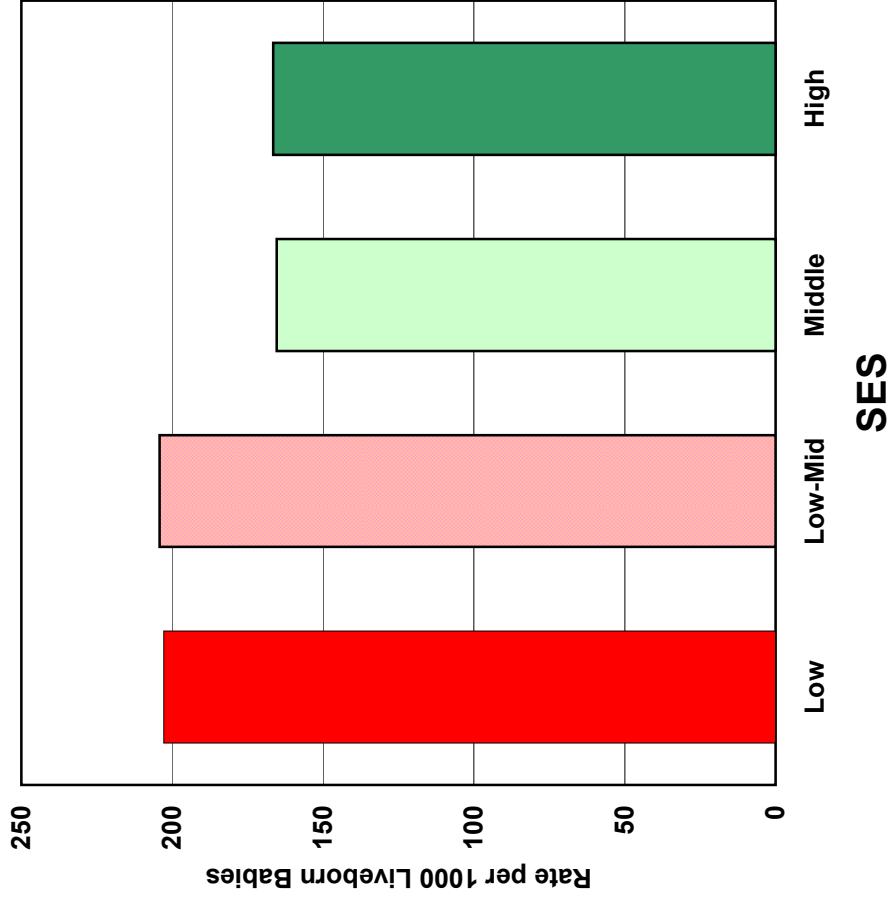
Health Indicators: High Birth Weight Rates by SES Groups

Unlike low birth weight rates, high birth weight rates did not show a consistent pattern with socioeconomic status. For Winnipeg residents, those living in higher SES areas had slightly higher rates of high birth weight babies, compared to those living in lower SES areas. For non-Winnipeg residents, higher rates of high birth weight babies were found in the areas with lower SES.
