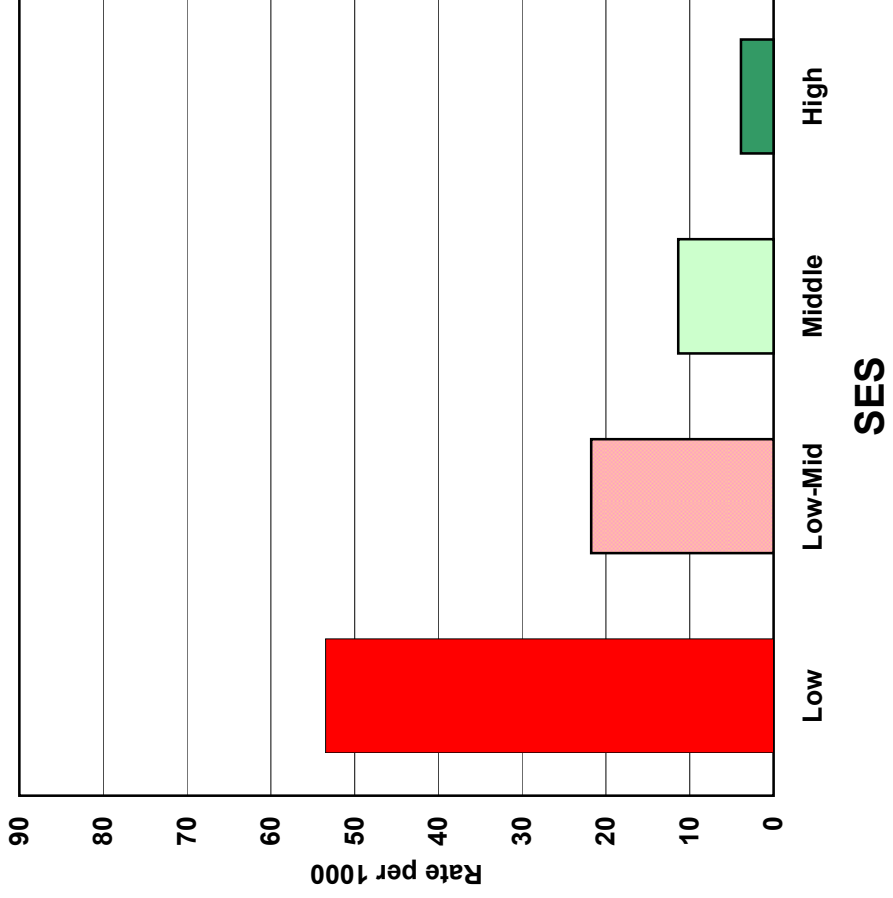

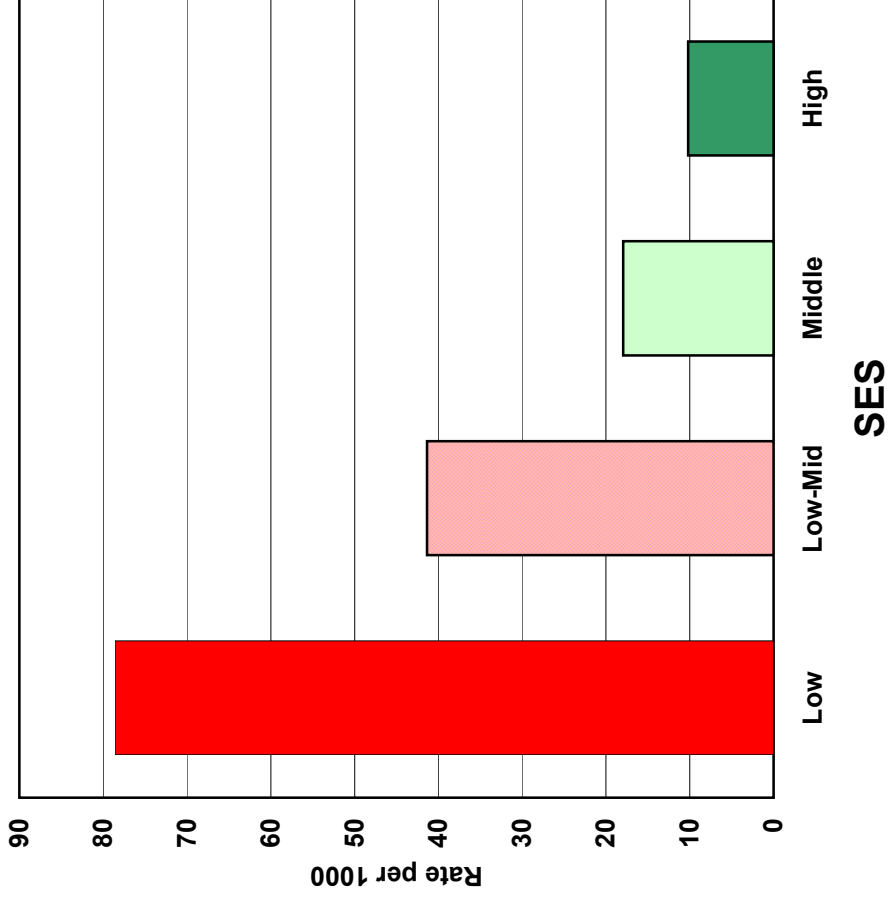
Health Indicators: Teen Birth Rates by SES Group

Teen birth rates are strongly related to socioeconomic status (SES) both inside and outside Winnipeg, with higher rates found in lower SES areas. In Winnipeg, the rate of teen births was almost two-and-a-half times higher in the Low SES areas compared to the Low-Mid SES areas, and over thirteen-and-a-half times higher than the High SES areas. For non-Winnipeg residents, although the rates tended to be higher than those found in Winnipeg, the discrepancies across SES groups were not quite as large: the rate of teen births was almost two times higher in the Low SES compared to the Low-Mid SES, and almost eight times higher than the High SES areas.
