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

Community Resource Indicators: Rate of School Breakfast Programs for Children Aged 6-17 Years, by Winnipeg NC

These graphs show a broad overview of the rate of breakfast programs offered at schools in Winnipeg during the year 2000. Not all schools offered breakfast programs. In the Low SES areas, a total of 19 breakfast programs were offered. In the Low-Mid SES areas, there were 7 and in the Middle SES areas there were 6. No breakfast programs were offered in the High SES areas.


The first graph shows the rate of these breakfast programs for all children aged 6 to 17 years, and the second graph shows the rate for children in the lowest income quintile aged 6 to 17 years. In the first graph we see that the higher number of breakfast programs in the lower SES areas potentially reach more children. (For example, in Point Douglas South, there are 3.1 breakfast programs for every 1000 kids, compared to about 0.2 breakfast programs for every 1000 kids in St. Boniface East.) However, when the results are viewed as a rate for kids in the lowest income quintile, the picture changes. Lower income areas will have more low-income kids, so the breakfast programs in these areas potentially reach fewer *low income* kids compared to the higher SES areas. (For example, the number of breakfast programs for low income kids in Point Douglas South remains 3 per 1000, whereas the number of breakfast programs for low income kids in St. Boniface East is now close to 13 per 1000.)
